SUBJECT: Update on the Proceedings of the State Championship Committee – April 27 Meeting

The State Championship Committee for the 2026-30 four-year time block held its sixth and final public meeting at the OSAA offices in Wilsonville on Monday, April 27, 2026, to receive testimony and review written correspondence received thus far. The Committee once again utilized a hybrid format for the meeting that allowed both committee members and those seeking to provide input the option of participating in-person or via webinar. The public portion of these meetings has been streamed live to the OSAA YouTube channel.

The Committee received testimony regarding thirteen different sports/activities from forty individuals in-person and online, including several proposals submitted by the Oregon Athletic Coaches Association (OACA). They also reviewed 144 pieces of written correspondence submitted prior to the meeting. The Committee then adjourned to a closed work session to review and discuss the testimony, written correspondence received, and information prepared by the OSAA staff prior to the meeting.

The Committee once again discussed their charge as it relates to the recommendations made by the Championships Threshold Task Force that met throughout the 2024-25 school year. The Task Force's recommendations were supported by the Delegate Assembly and the OADA in April 2025, before being submitted to the Executive Board. The Executive Board also supported the recommendations and included them in the charge for the State Championship Committee to review and consider.

Recommendations made by the Championships Thresholds Task Force regarding an optimal state championship qualification percentage range for team sports, individual sports, and activities between 30%-40%, with a low-end base of 25% and high-end cap of 45%.

The following were items of discussion by the group. The Committee is forwarding the following recommendations for consideration by the Executive Board at its May 11 meeting. The Committee is aware that while these recommendations are for the 2026-30 time block, the OSAA Staff and Executive Board will continue to review championship events throughout the next four years for potential adjustments as necessary.

TEAM SPORTS

Team Sports Bracket Sizes

The Committee received feedback following their last meeting regarding team sports brackets sizes released for Girls Volleyball, Boys and Girls Soccer, Boys and Girls Basketball, Baseball, and Softball. Committee members heard some correspondence about the bracket sizes, and number of automatic qualifiers in certain classifications, but remain supportive of the proposals from the previous update, with a few adjustments at the 4A classification.

6A: 24-team brackets – Per a proposal from the 6A classification, one AQ from each regular league and the Southwest Hybrid, with the next 9 teams based on rankings as at-large qualifiers. Teams 17-32 based on the rankings would participate in 8 qualification contests prior to the regular season cutoff. Winners of the 8 qualification contests advance as at-large teams 17-24 to the OSAA's 24-team state championship bracket.

5A: 16-team brackets – Two AQ's each for 5A-1, 5A-2, 5A-3, 5A-4, and Midwestern Hybrid, one AQ for the Southwest Hybrid for a total of 11 AQ's. There will be five at-large qualifiers based on rankings.

4A: 16-team brackets – Two AQ's per league, along with the highest ranked 3rd place team between the Sky-Em and Skyline, plus three at-large qualifiers based on rankings (the next 3 highest ranked teams from the third-place teams of the other five leagues).

3A: 18-team brackets – Two AQ’s each for 3A-1, 3A-2, 3A-3, 3A-4, 3A-5, and 3A-7, three AQ’s for 3A-6 for a total of 15 AQ’s, plus three at-large qualifiers based on rankings.

2A: 22-team brackets – Two AQ’s per league, plus six at-large qualifiers based on rankings.

1A: 28-team brackets – Two AQ’s per league, plus 12 at-large qualifiers based on rankings.

The Committee has based these bracket sizes on the best estimate of the number of teams planning to participate in these team sports at each classification, with the understanding that if leagues/special districts change the number of participating teams, AQ’s for those specific leagues/special districts could be adjusted. Bracket sizes for classifications in team sports with special districts (Boys Volleyball, 2A/1A Baseball and 2A/1A Softball, etc.) will use similar percentages as the team sports above. With those sports being volatile with the number of schools sponsoring the sport each year, OSAA will create bracket sizes based on the number of schools sponsoring once they are known.

Leagues/Special Districts with end of season district tournaments would be allowed to conduct 3rd place contests as part of those district tournaments, even if only receiving two AQ’s, as those games would count toward rankings and determining the at-large qualifiers for that classification.

3A/2A/1A Girls Soccer

3A/2A/1A – 20-team bracket (top 4 teams from SD1, SD2, SD3, top 2 teams from SD4 and top 3 teams from SD5, plus 3 at-large qualifiers based on rankings).

3A, 2A/1A Boys Soccer

3A – 14-team bracket (top 3 teams from SD1, SD2, and Far West League, top 2 teams from Mountain Valley and Greater Oregon Hybrid, plus 1 at-large qualifier based on rankings).

2A/1A – 12-team bracket (top 2 in each Special District, top 2 from the Greater Oregon Hybrid, plus 2 at-large qualifiers based on rankings).

Football Bracket Sizes

The Committee spent significant time on this topic, including a review of the Football Ad Hoc Committee’s final recommendations and proposed allocations. The Committee remained supportive of the bracket size recommendations made in the previous meeting and have now added the qualifications for each classification.

6A – 24-team bracket (16 – team 6A Championship bracket, and an 8-team Columbia Cup bracket; top 3 teams from the PIL (if only eight teams compete at the varsity level, the AQ’s will go back to 2), top 2 teams from Metro, Pacific, Mt. Hood, Three Rivers, SD1 and SD2, plus the next 9 highest ranked teams not an automatic qualifier. The 6A Championship Bracket will consist of the League/Special District Champions, then the nine highest ranked teams not a League/Special District Champion. The Columbia Cup will consist of the 8 next highest ranked teams, not in the 6A Championship bracket.

5A – 16-team bracket (top team from SD1 and SD2 (plus the highest ranked 2nd place team between SD1 and SD2), and top 2 teams from SD3, SD4, SD5 and IMC, plus 5 at-large teams based on rankings)

4A – 16-team bracket (top 3 teams from SD1, SD2, SD3, SD4, top 2 teams from SD5, then 2 at-large teams from the 4th place teams in SD1, SD2, SD3, SD4 and 3rd place team from SD5 based on rankings)

3A – 14-team bracket (top 3 teams from SD1, SD2, top 2 teams from SD3, SD4, SD5, then 2 at-large teams based on rankings)

2A – 16-team bracket (top 2 teams from each Special District, then 4 at-large teams based on rankings)

1A-8 player – 14-team bracket (top 2 teams from SD1, SD2, top 3 teams from SD3, SD4, then 4 at-large teams based on rankings)

1A-6 player – 12-team bracket (top 3 teams from SD1, SD2, SD3, then 3 at-large teams based on rankings)

INDIVIDUAL SPORTS

The Committee spent a lot of time discussing all the different individual sports state qualifying allocations and standards. After reviewing participation numbers from recent years, they worked to align with the Championship Threshold guidelines for the proposals listed below. Throughout the process the group heard from schools about limiting the number of Special Districts to keep regular district schools together as much as possible. Including all schools of a regular district into a Special District as opposed to balancing the number of participants in each Special District led to situations where some Special Districts will receive additional automatic qualifiers. There were some edits from the previous proposal as the staff needed to adjust school placements to keep schools in regular districts and those schools are bolded in this proposal. You can also see the proposed Leagues and Special Districts on the attached pages.

Cross Country

As in previous years, the Selection Committee for each classification that determines the at-large teams will consist of a member from each League/Special District. This Committee determines the qualifying teams based on team's overall performances across the entire season, not just the times posted at the League/Special District qualifying event.

6A – 16 teams to qualify for State (top 2 teams in each League/Special District, plus 2 at-large teams), plus any individual who finishes in the top 14 not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships.

5A – 12 teams to qualify for State (top 2 teams in each League/Special District, plus 2 at-large teams), additionally any individual who finishes in the top seven not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships.

4A - 12 teams to qualify for State (League Champion from each League, plus 6 at-large teams), additionally any individual who finishes in the top seven not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships.

3A Boys – 12 teams to qualify for State (top three teams from SD1, SD2, and SD3, top two teams in SD 4, plus 1 at-large team), additionally any individual who finishes in the top seven not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships.

3A Girls – 8 teams to qualify for State (top two teams from SD1, SD2, and SD3, top team in SD 4, plus 1 at-large teams), additionally any individual who finishes in the top four not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships. For the 3A Girls, the teams may run up to 7 athletes but will use the top 4 athletes for team scores. The goal in changing to count 4 is that this will help grow the number of 3A Girls teams and that a move back to counting 5 would occur in the future.

2A/1A Boys – 15 teams to qualify for State (top three teams from SD1, SD3, and SD4, top four teams in SD 2, plus 2 at-large teams), additionally any individual who finishes in the top seven not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships.

2A/1A Girls – 8 teams to qualify for State (top two teams from SD2, and League Champion from SD1, SD3, and SD4, plus 3 at-large teams), additionally any individual who finishes in the top four not a member of a qualifying team will qualify as an individual for the state championships. For the 2A/1A Girls, the teams may run up to 7 athletes but will use the top 4 athletes for team scores. The goal in counting 4 is that this will help grow the number of 2A/1A Girls teams and that a move to counting 5 would occur in the future.

Swimming

6A: 18 slots will qualify per event (First place winner in each individual and relay event at each District Meet automatically qualifies, along with any individual or relay that meets the qualifying standard – 9th place average of the last three State Meets with the standard never to be easier than the previous year). The remaining slots will be filled with the next fastest times from District Meet Finals, up to a total of 18 participants/relays per event.

5A: 12 slots will qualify per event (First place winner in each individual and relay event at each District Meet automatically qualifies). The remaining slots will be filled by the next fastest time from District Meet Finals, up to a total of 12 participants per event.

4A/3A/2A/1A: 12 slots will qualify per event (First place winner in each individual and relay event at each District Meet automatically qualifies). The remaining slots will be filled by the next fastest time from District Meet Finals, up to a total of 12 participants per event.

Wrestling

After testimony and correspondence, the Committee deliberated for quite some time on this activity, and with the ability to maintain an acceptable schedule at the state championships, the Committee decided to increase the 3A boys classification to a 12-person bracket. The Committee also went with the 4A recommendation of removing their at-large qualifiers and going to the top 4 in each Special District.

6A Boys – 24-person bracket (top 3 wrestlers from each weight class, plus 3 at-large wrestlers per weight class)

6A Girls – 12-person bracket (top 3 wrestlers from each Special District, plus 3 at-large wrestlers per weight class)

5A Boys – 16-person bracket (top 3 wrestlers from each weight class, plus 1 at-large wrestler per weight class)

5A Girls – 12-person bracket (top 4 wrestlers from SD1 and SD2, top 3 wrestlers from the IMC, plus 1 at-large wrestler per weight class)

4A Boys – 16-person bracket (top 4 wrestlers from each weight class)

4A/3A/2A/1A Girls – 16-person bracket (top 4 wrestlers from each Special District per weight class)

3A Boys – 12-person bracket (top 3 wrestlers from each Special District in each weight class)

2A/1A Boys – 12-person bracket (top 4 wrestlers from SD1 and SD3 and top 3 wrestlers from SD2, plus 1 at-large wrestler per weight class)

Golf

After reading correspondence and listening to testimony, it was determined that the 6A, 5A, and 4A regional event proposals hadn't included individual qualifiers from the leagues to the regionals. The Committee added back the top 4 individuals not on a qualifying team from each league to the regionals.

6A Boys – Leagues: Top team from each league, plus the top individual not on the qualifying team will qualify directly to the State Championship. **Regionals:** Each league's 2nd, 3rd, 4th place teams qualify for the regional along with the top 4 individuals not on a regional qualifying team (see rotation below). Top two teams from each of three regionals will qualify. Top two individuals not on qualifying teams from Regions 1 & 3, plus the top three individuals from Region 2, will qualify.

6A Girls – Leagues: Top team from each league, plus the top individual not on the qualifying team will qualify directly to the State Championship. **Regionals:** Each league's 2nd, 3rd, 4th place teams qualify for the regional along with the top 4 individuals not on a regional qualifying team (see rotation below). Top team from each of three regionals will qualify. Top three individuals not on qualifying teams from Regions 1 & 3, plus the top four individuals from Region 2, will qualify.

5A Boys and Girls – Leagues: Top team from each league, plus the top individual not on the qualifying team will qualify directly to the State Championship. **Regionals:** Each league's 2nd, 3rd, 4th place teams qualify for the regional along with the top 4 individuals not on a regional qualifying team. Top three teams from Region 1 and top two teams from Region 2 will qualify. Top three individuals not on qualifying teams from Region 1 and the top two individuals from Region 2, will qualify. Region 1 consists of Northwest Oregon Conference, Greater Metro Conference and the Mid-Willamette Conference; Region 2 consists of Intermountain Conference and the Southern Hybrid.

4A Boys – League: Top team from each league, plus the top individual not on the qualifying team will qualify directly to the State Championship. **Regionals:** Each league's 2nd and 3rd place teams qualify for the regional along with the top 4 individuals not on a regional qualifying team. Top two teams from Region 1 and Region 2 will qualify. Top two individuals not on qualifying teams from Region 1 and Region 2 will qualify. Region 1 is Cowapa, Tri-Valley, and Greater Oregon, Region 2 consists of Oregon West, Sky-Em and Skyline Leagues.

4A/3A/2A/1A Girls – 11 teams (top 3 teams from SD1, SD3, and SD 4, and top 2 teams from SD2) plus the top 6 individuals not on a qualifying team from each Special District will qualify for the State Championship.

3A/2A/1A Boys – 11 teams (top 3 teams from SD2, SD3, and SD 4, and top 2 teams from SD1) additionally, the top 6 individuals not on a qualifying team from each Special District will qualify for the State Championship.

Tennis – Individuals

6A Boys and Girls – 28-person bracket for singles and doubles (top 4 from each League) will qualify for the State Championships.

5A Boys and Girls – 20-person bracket for singles and doubles (top 4 from each League) will qualify for the State Championships. With 5 leagues now at 5A, this championship will begin on Thursday afternoon.

4A/3A/2A/1A Boys and Girls – 20-person bracket for singles and doubles (top 4 from each Special District) will qualify for the State Championships.

With the addition of the Team Championship, schools competing in the Individual Championships will not receive a Team Championship trophy.

Tennis - Teams

After reading correspondence and hearing testimony, along with the understanding that this is the first attempt to include a team championship for tennis, it's proposed that the 6A boys and girls brackets increase to 12 teams due to the number of teams that compete. This adds an extra round to the 6A bracket schedule within the same timeline, knowing that schools will have some flexibility to adjust within that timeline provided that the finalist teams are determined prior to the League/Special Districts individual tournaments. Team Championships brackets will be treated like team sport playoffs. The matches will take place at the higher seeded team's venue until the team championship final match, which will be held at the State Individual Championship site. These duals will take

place prior to the Individual District/Special District meets. For the 2026-27 tennis season, the freeze date will be Saturday, May 1. The first round for the Girls will be Tuesday, May 4th, the Boys will be Wednesday, May 5th. The semifinals will take place for the Girls on Friday, May 7th, and for the Boys Saturday, May 8th. The 6A schools will need to complete three rounds during this week. Individual district tournaments are not affected by this schedule. One topic that was brought up that the Committee discussed was determining a standard tiebreaker policy for the team matches. The tiebreaker to be used if 2 teams are tied after the four singles and four doubles matches will first be the number of sets won and if still tied it will then go to the number of games won. An additional tiebreaker, potentially to include a 10-point tiebreak of an additional predetermined match, along with specific rainout procedures, etc. will be determined in consultation with schools prior to next season.

6A Boys and Girls – 12-team bracket (top team from each League, plus 5 at-large teams). The at-large team will be determined by a committee (one rep from each League). The team championship final match will take place on Wednesday at state.

5A Boys and Girls – 8-team bracket (top team from each League, plus three at-large team). The three at-large teams will be determined by a committee. The team championship final match will take place on Thursday at state.

4A/3A/2A/1A Boys and Girls – 8-team bracket (top team from each Special District, plus three at-large teams). The at-large teams will be determined by a committee (one rep from each Special District). The team championship final match will take place on Thursday at state.

Track & Field

The order of qualifications will be: automatic qualifiers from each League/Special District, Qualifying Standard times/marks (individuals or relays that meet the standard of 4th place average of the last four State Meets with the standard never to be easier than the previous year), and wildcards, if available, up to the total allotment available for each classification. To help with the wildcard spots in the vertical events (high jump and pole vault), the League/Special Districts will be required to keep track of the attempts and submit those with their state entries so that ties in the vertical events will be broken by number of attempts.

6A – A minimum of 17 competitors will qualify at the 6A. Fourteen participants per event will be automatic qualifiers (2 per league). The remaining qualifying spots will be filled in this order:

- 1) All athletes meeting the adopted qualifying standard in that event – regardless of number.
- 2) If application of (1) does not produce at least 17 entries, then wildcard qualifier(s) will be added. Wildcard qualifiers will have the next best time/mark in that event from a combination of all times/marks from all District Meets.

5A – A minimum of 14 competitors will qualify at the 5A. Ten participants per event will be automatic qualifiers (2 per league). The remaining qualifying spots will be filled in this order:

- 1) All athletes meeting the adopted qualifying standard in that event – regardless of number.
- 2) If application of (1) does not produce at least 14 entries, then wildcard qualifier(s) will be added. Wildcard qualifiers will have the next best time/mark in that event from a combination of all times/marks from all District Meets.

4A – A minimum of 14 competitors will qualify at the 4A. Twelve participants per event will be automatic qualifiers (2 per league). The remaining qualifying spots will be filled in this order:

- 1) All athletes meeting the adopted qualifying standard in that event – regardless of number.
- 2) If application of (1) does not produce at least 14 entries, then wildcard qualifier(s) will be added. Wildcard qualifiers will have the next best time/mark in that event from a combination of all times/marks from all District Meets.

3A – A minimum of 13 competitors will qualify at the 3A. Twelve participants per event will be automatic qualifiers (three from SD1, SD2, four qualifiers from SD3 and 2 from Eastern Oregon League). The remaining qualifying spots will be filled in this order:

- 1) All athletes meeting the adopted qualifying standard in that event – regardless of number.
- 2) If application of (1) does not produce at least 13 entries, then wildcard qualifier(s) will be added. Wildcard qualifiers will have the next best time/mark in that event from a combination of all times/marks from all District Meets.

2A – A minimum of 13 competitors will qualify at the 2A. Eleven participants per event will be automatic qualifiers (3 from SD1, SD2, SD3, and 2 qualifiers from SD4). The remaining qualifying spots will be filled in this order:

- 1) All athletes meeting the adopted qualifying standard in that event – regardless of number.
- 2) If application of (1) does not produce at least 13 entries, then wildcard qualifier(s) will be added. Wildcard qualifiers will have the next best time/mark in that event from a combination of all times/marks from all District Meets.

1A – A minimum of 10 competitors will qualify at the 1A. Nine participants per event will be automatic qualifiers (2 from SD1, SD2, SD4 and 3 qualifiers from SD3). The remaining qualifying spots will be filled in this order:

- 1) All athletes meeting the adopted qualifying standard in that event – regardless of number.
- 2) If application of (1) does not produce at least 10 entries, then wildcard qualifier(s) will be added. Wildcard qualifiers will have the next best time/mark in that event from a combination of all times/marks from all District Meets.

Board Policy – State Championships – Adding/Deleting a Championship Event

The Committee remains supportive of recommending changes to this policy to better define participation in individual sports that also qualify teams for state championships (cross country and golf) and recognize the difficulty for smaller schools to offer two team only sports in the same season. These potential changes balance the desire to offer more equitable participation opportunities while maintaining a policy that would need to be met. Recommendations include:

- In Individual Sports, for a separate championship to be held in these hybrid sports, at least 75% of the schools in the classification need to participate in the activity **AND EITHER**
 - o ****50%** of the total # of schools in the classification must have the minimum number of students for a team
 - * 70 2A/1A schools offer Girls Cross Country
 - * There are 51 schools in the 2A classification
 - * At least 26 schools need to offer a varsity team of at least 4 to meet this requirement
 - OR**
 - o ****The total # of individual participants at varsity district meets must be at least 50% of the total # of participants if all participating schools had the minimum number of students for a team.**
 - * 70 2A/1A schools offer Girls Cross Country
 - * If each of the 70 had 4 athletes, which would equal 280 athletes
 - * The total number of individual participants in the proposed classification would need to exceed 140 athletes to meet this requirement.
- In Team Sports, at the 3A, 2A, and 1A classification, in the Fall (football and boys soccer; girls volleyball and girls soccer) or Spring (baseball and boys volleyball), where two team only sports in a gender are offered, that the percentage required to consider offering a championship event in a classification be reduced from 67% to 50%. The goal of this is for growth, so the OSAA will be monitoring these activities to ensure that is occurring, and these activities will be reviewed for future recommendations.

Girls Volleyball Single Court Venues

The Committee is supportive of a single court format for all Girls Volleyball State Championships provided there are facilities available to host these championships.

4A Basketball State Championships Venues

The 4A classification has expressed strong interest in OSAA securing either a new 2nd facility in conjunction with the main gym at Forest Grove High School or potentially a new site if a 2nd facility near Forest Grove can't be located. OSAA Staff will work directly with the Executive Board on this request.

7-Person Official Crews for 11-player Football in Semifinals and Finals

After discussion, the Committee supports having the option for schools to use 7-person crews. The Committee is supportive and recommends that all semifinal and final 11-player football state championship games use 7-person crews. Schools will be allowed to request for 7-person crews during the regular season, but Officials' Associations may not request that seven be used and can only schedule them if there are enough officials to cover all of the remaining contests. Other contests may not be moved in order for a 7-person game to take place during the regular season.

ACTIVITIES

Cheerleading

The Committee heard testimony that the OCCA would like to break out Game Day into large and small teams just like Traditional. The Committee is supportive of this provided that thresholds are met within each division. Large teams are defined as teams 16 or greater and small teams are defined as teams 15 or less. The Committee also supports schools being able to compete in both the Game Day Division and the Traditional Division at the state championships. OCCA believes this will help increase interest in their activity and it is already allowed in Dance/Drill. With the additional opportunities for cheerleaders to compete and two categories, medals will not be awarded at the State Championships, only team trophies.

Dance/Drill

The Committee heard testimony in favor of separating out 5A schools from 4A/3A/2A/1A schools. Following a thorough review of the current number of teams participating at each classification, the Committee continues to support combining 5A with 4A/3A/2A/1A. However, the Committee also recognizes and would support separating those classifications back out in the future if the number of 4A/3A/2A/1A schools increases enough to meet the threshold to have their own state championship in each category. The Committee is not supportive of providing medals in Dance given the opportunity for schools to participate in multiple categories. Schools are able to purchase medals for their teams following the state championships. Another proposal requested that qualification standards be lowered so more teams can qualify for their second category. The Committee does not support lowering the qualification standards in order to have more schools participating in their second category. The Committee believes the current practice of a minimum of five schools is sufficient and should not be reduced. A third proposal for the collapsing of divisions where the minimum of 5 teams isn't met wasn't supported by the Committee. The Committee is in favor of keeping the current five team requirement per category.

Choir

The Committee received written correspondence and testimony supporting a change to the Choir State Championships to move away from rankings (1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc.) to a ratings-based approach (Superior, Outstanding, Excellent) used in other states. Committee members will recommend this ratings-based approach. The Committee also heard from the OMEA and ACDA professional organizations and encourages those organizations to help identify and increase the number of school choirs participating throughout the year in order for growth to occur. The Committee recommends separating back out the 3A and the 2A/1A Choir Championships and will direct the OSAA to work closely with OMEA/ACDA to improve data collection regarding participation/competition numbers moving forward.

The Committee recommends, based on a thorough review of the actual number of choirs participating at each classification, adjusting the number of qualifying choirs.

6A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 20 total.

5A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 12 total.

4A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 10 total.

3A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 6 total.

2A/1A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 8 total.

Band

Similar to Choir, the Committee heard from the OMEA and OBDA professional organizations and encourages those organizations to help identify and increase the number of school bands participating throughout the year in order for growth to occur. The Committee recommends separating back out the 3A and the 2A/1A Band Championships and will direct the OSAA to work closely with OMEA/OBDA to improve data collection regarding participation/competition numbers moving forward.

The Committee recommends, based on a thorough review of the actual number of choirs participating at each classification, adjusting the number of qualifying bands.

6A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to bands selected from a tape pool not to exceed 18 total.

5A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to bands selected from a tape pool not to exceed 11 total.

4A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to bands selected from a tape pool not to exceed 10 total.

3A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 8 total.

2A/1A – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to choirs selected from a tape pool not to exceed 6 total.

Orchestra

Similar to Choir and Band, the Committee heard from the OMEA professional organization and encourages that organization to help identify and increase the number of school orchestras participating throughout the year in order for growth to occur. The Committee will direct the OSAA to work closely with OMEA/OBDA to improve data collection regarding participation/competition numbers moving forward as the total number of schools offering the activity is currently below the threshold.

String – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to string orchestras selected from a tape pool not to exceed 15 total.

Full – After all automatic qualifiers have been scheduled, the additional performance opportunities shall be provided to full orchestras selected from a tape pool not to exceed 6 total.

Speech

New Special Districts were put into place for the 2025-26 school year in Speech and qualifying district tournaments were recently completed. After reviewing this year's qualifiers, OSAA Staff will continue to work with schools to make slight adjustments to the special districts to ensure qualifying percentages remain in alignment with the Championship Thresholds Task Force recommendations.

Solo Music

Solo Music Special District qualifying events were recently completed. OSAA Staff will be reviewing qualifiers in alignment with the Championship Thresholds Task Force recommendations.

The release of the Committee's Final Recommendation is not the final step in the public process. Member schools and the public will also have the opportunity to respond to the Committee's Final Recommendation to the Executive Board in writing prior to and/or in person at the public meeting at which the Board will act on the Final Recommendation on May 11, 2026, at the OSAA offices, Wilsonville. The Board will meet at 9am to consider member school written input and public testimony prior to acting on the Committee's Final Recommendation.

6.7. Association Year, Practice, Contests – Starting, Cutoff and Ending Dates. [\(NFHS Standardized Calendar\)](#)

- 6.7.1. Association Year.** The Association Year shall start with the first day of practice for fall sports on the Monday of Week 7 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (August 18, 2025) and shall end at the end of the day on Memorial Day (May 25, 2026). “Summer season” activities may begin on the Tuesday following the observance of Memorial Day (May 26, 2026).
- 6.7.2. Fall Sports.** Practice shall not start prior to the Monday of Week 7 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (August 18, 2025). The first contest shall not be played prior to the Thursday of Week 8 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (August 28, 2025) for all Fall Sports, except Football. Football jamborees shall not be played prior to the Thursday of Week 8 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (August 28, 2025). The first contest date for Football shall not be played prior to the Friday of Week 8 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (August 29, 2025).
- 6.7.3. Winter Sports.** Practice shall not start prior to the Monday of Week 20 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (November 17, 2025). The first contest shall not be played prior to the Wednesday of Week 22 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (December 3, 2025).
- 6.7.4. Spring Sports.** Practice shall not start prior to the Monday of Week 35 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (March 2, 2026). The first contest shall not be played prior to the Monday of Week 37 of the NFHS Standardized Calendar (March 16, 2026).
- 6.7.5. Cutoff and Ending Dates.** The Executive Board shall adopt a calendar each year that will include the cutoff date for each season at each classification after which regular season contests in that activity may no longer be conducted. The season for a school in a sport shall end on the cutoff date or when all state championship contests have concluded for that school in that sport. The sub-varsity cutoff date for all classifications in each team sport shall align with the latest varsity cutoff date at any classification in that team sport. **EXCEPTION: The football sub-varsity cutoff date shall be the Monday following the latest varsity football cutoff date.**

Proposal to Amend Board Policy – Emergency Action Plans

(First Reading)

QUESTION: Should the Executive Board amend Board Policy – Emergency Action Plans in alignment with recently passed legislation (HB 4160) which goes into effect in July 2027?

RATIONALE: House Bill 4160 was recently passed and adds requirements on Oregon public education providers, including required training in CPR and use of AEDs for all coaches, at least one AED at the school, additional AEDs in locations that are clearly identified at school, practices and competitions, plus a plan for cardiac emergency responses. Amending this board policy to include a plan for cardiac emergency responses in a school's EAP and requirements for AEDs aligns with the legislation.

EMERGENCY ACTION PLANS

(December 2015)

Each full member school shall have **venue and team specific** Emergency Action Plans (EAP) in place for responding to life-threatening emergencies in after-school practices and events. **These plans shall be reviewed and practiced annually.**

- A. **Per state statute, the EAP must include a cardiac emergency response that complies with ORS 339.345 and aligns with core elements established by a national organization focused on emergency cardiovascular care.**
- B. **Per state statute, each member school must have at least one automated external defibrillator (AED) at the school. Additionally, each member school shall provide placement of AEDs that, to the greatest extent practicable, is in accordance with guidelines established by a national organization focused on emergency cardiovascular care; and is in locations that are clearly identified, unlocked and accessible when:**
 - 1) **Students are at school; and**
 - 2) **Students are at athletic practices or competitions at the school.**

Schools shall develop a procedure for sharing the location of AEDs at the school with local emergency medical services (EMS) providers and maintain and test their AEDs as required by the manufacturer's guidelines.

Schools are strongly encouraged to utilize the "Anyone Can Save a Life" program, a free, turnkey solution that covers all medical emergencies.

Proposal to Add Board Policy – Sports Safety Officer

(First Reading)

QUESTION: *Should the Executive Board add Board Policy – Sports Safety Officer to require each full member school to designate a point of contact to promote consistent implementation and timely communication of policies?*

RATIONALE: The OSAA’s Sports Medicine Advisory Committee has discussed this concept for several years. They believe that having each school designate a Sports Safety Officer will help promote consistent implementation of OSAA sport safety policies and ensure timely communication of safety-related information between OSAA and its member schools.

SPORT SAFETY OFFICER

A. DESIGNATION

1. *Serve as the primary OSAA contact for sport safety information and updates.*

 - b) *Air Quality Guidelines*
 - c) *Certification – Athletic Directors and Coaches*

 - f) *Heat Index*
 - g) *Lightning Safety Guidelines*
 - h) *Pre-Event Safety Timeout*

Proposal to the Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) – 2A Basketball Participation Rule Adjustment

Submitted by: Wapiti Conference

Overview

The Wapiti Conference respectfully proposes that the OSAA adopt a **6-quarter per day participation rule** for the 2A classification in basketball, similar to the rule currently implemented at the 1A level.

Rationale

- **Conference Composition**

The Wapiti Conference consists of seven schools, six of which—Harper, Crane, Imbler, Union, Cove, and Elgin—have recently moved from 1A to 2A due to enrollment thresholds. These schools continue to operate at a 1A participation level despite competing in the 2A classification.

- **Maintaining Junior Varsity Opportunities**

The current structure often forces schools to choose between:

- Playing full Junior Varsity (JV) games, or
- Reducing to shortened (“half”) games due to roster size, travel costs, and availability of officials

The 6-quarter rule would allow schools to consistently offer full JV games, increasing participation opportunities.

- **Alignment with Existing OSAA Rules**

The OSAA currently allows athletes to compete in two games per day at the same level (JV or Varsity), totaling up to 8 quarters of play.

A 6-quarter limit would remain within a safe and reasonable participation range while improving flexibility.

-

- **Addressing Competition Concerns**

Concerns about younger athletes (e.g., freshmen) competing against older players already exist in small schools. In practice:

- If a freshman is capable, they already participate at the varsity level
- The proposed rule does not introduce a new issue, but rather reflects existing realities in small school athletics
- Moving to the 2A classification does not increase student participation numbers, as our schools continue to operate with the same limited roster sizes

- **Regional Consideration**

If a statewide implementation is not feasible, we request consideration for a regional exception for Eastern Oregon.

This would allow small 2A schools to:

- Compete more effectively with nearby 1A programs
- Maintain consistent scheduling and full-game opportunities

- **Equity and Inclusion**

This proposal supports OSAA's mission by:

- Expanding participation opportunities for student-athletes
- Promoting equity across small and rural schools
- Allowing more students meaningful playing time over a four-year high school career

Request

The Wapiti Conference respectfully requests that the OSAA:

1. **Adopt a 6-quarter per day participation limit for 2A basketball**, consistent with the 1A classification
- OR**
2. **Allow a regional exception for Eastern Oregon 2A schools** to implement this rule

Conclusion

This adjustment would better align participation opportunities with the realities of small-school athletics while maintaining student safety and competitive balance. The Wapiti Conference is committed to supporting equitable, inclusive, and sustainable athletic programs for all student-athletes.

At the Oregon Athletic Directors Conference in Sunriver, the 2A group of Athletic Directors voted to pass the 6 quarters 32 yes 1 no.



Proposal: Change Participation Limitations from Team-Based to Individual-Based

Activity Areas: Wrestling

Consideration: Track & Field and Cross Country

Proposal Summary:

Modify current participation limitation rules so that competition dates, weigh-ins, and participation limits are applied to individual athletes rather than counting against the entire team.

Rationale:

Under the current system, when a team splits to compete in multiple events on the same date, all events count toward every athlete on the roster—regardless of whether they participated.

Example:

If a team sends half of its wrestlers to one two-day tournament and the other half to a different two-day tournament on the same dates, all wrestlers are charged with two competition dates and four weigh-ins, even though each individual only competed in one event.

This creates an inaccurate accounting of participation and unnecessarily limits opportunities for athletes.

Additionally, smaller classification schools (1A/2A/3A) with larger rosters face challenges in providing competition opportunities for JV athletes. Unlike larger schools, they often lack access to events that do not count toward varsity participation limits, creating an equity imbalance.

Proposed Change:

- Participation limits (dates, weigh-ins, contests) will be tracked and applied per individual athlete.
- Only the events in which an athlete actually participates will count toward their limitations.
- Team participation in multiple same-day events will no longer count cumulatively against all athletes.

Benefits / Pros:

- Aligns participation limits with actual athlete involvement
- Increases opportunities for student-athletes to compete
- Improves developmental opportunities for JV athletes
- Addresses equity concerns between small and large classification schools
- Encourages flexible scheduling without penalizing non-participating athletes

Concerns / Considerations:

- Requires tracking participation at the individual level (administrative/logistical adjustment)
- Need for clear compliance guidelines to ensure consistent application

Recommendation:

Approve the transition to an individual-based participation limitation model in wrestling.

We also would recommend consideration of similar adjustments for Track & Field and Cross Country, where comparable participation structures exist.

Proposal: Adjust Wrestling Match Limitations to 14 Contests / 50 Matches (Individual-Based)

Proposal Summary:

Revise current wrestling participation rules to allow 14 contests and 50 matches per individual athlete, eliminating the daily weigh-in limitation, while maintaining overall competition limits. Participation would be tracked at the individual level, not team-based.

Rationale:

Wrestling already includes both daily and season-long match limitations that effectively prevent excessive competition. However, the current structure—particularly the daily weigh-in limitation—adds complexity without significantly enhancing athlete safety.

This proposal simplifies participation rules while maintaining appropriate safeguards through contest and match limits.

Additionally, current rules can discourage teams from scheduling dual meets. In many dual situations, athletes may receive a forfeit yet are still charged with a weigh-in and contest, limiting flexibility and reducing opportunities for competition.

Proposed Change:

- Set participation limits at 14 contests and 50 matches per individual athlete
 - Eliminate the daily weigh-in limitation
 - Maintain existing contest and match structure (e.g., two-day events count as one contest)
 - Apply all limitations to individual athletes rather than entire teams
-

Benefits / Pros:

- Simplifies current participation rules and reduces administrative burden
 - Maintains athlete safety through match and contest limits
 - Increases scheduling flexibility for programs
 - Encourages more dual meet opportunities, including home-and-away formats
 - Reduces penalization for forfeits in dual competitions
 - Supports development of new special districts and local rivalries
 - Aligns Oregon more closely with surrounding states
-

Comparison to Neighboring States:

- Idaho: 16 contests (multi-day event = 1 contest), no match limit; individual-based
 - Washington: 16 contests (multi-day event = 1 contest), 45 match limit; individual-based
-

Concerns / Considerations:

- Removal of weigh-in limitations may raise questions about monitoring athlete workload
 - Requires clear tracking of individual contests and matches
 - Potential for increased scheduling variability across programs
 - Need to ensure consistent statewide compliance and understanding
-

Recommendation:

Approve the revised participation model of 14 contests / 50 matches per individual, and eliminate the daily weigh-in limitation to simplify regulations while maintaining athlete safety and competitive balance.

Proposal: 1A Basketball Contest Counting Adjustment (6-Quarter Participation Rule)

Purpose

This proposal recommends adjusting how 1A basketball contests are counted under the current 6-quarter participation rule to improve scheduling flexibility and increase participation opportunities for student-athletes.

Background

1A basketball programs currently operate under a 6-quarter participation limit, which has been highly beneficial for small schools by allowing athletes to contribute at both JV and varsity levels.

However, the current contest-counting system does not fully align with this model. Even though participation within the 6-quarter limit does not count as multiple contests, it still creates challenges when scheduling singleton games and limits opportunities to add contests early in the season.

Proposal

Allow up to six (6) quarters of participation within a defined week to count as one (1) contest for 1A basketball programs.

- Define the participation week as Tuesday through Monday, consistent with football guidelines.
- Any participation within the 6-quarter limit during that week counts as one contest, not multiple contests.
- Applies specifically to 1A classification.

Rationale

A. Aligns with Existing OSAA Practice

Football already uses a weekly participation model, counting quarters from Tuesday through Monday. Applying a similar structure to 1A basketball creates consistency across sports and provides a proven framework.

B. Supports Small School Rosters

1A programs rely heavily on multi-level (“floater”) athletes. This adjustment ensures they can participate fully without unintentionally exceeding contest limits.

C. Improves Scheduling Flexibility

Schools can schedule standalone or December games without being forced to pair them with varsity contests on the same day, reducing logistical challenges.

D. Aligns Policy with Intent

The 6-quarter rule was designed to expand opportunities. Adjusting contest counting ensures the rule functions as intended rather than creating unintended restrictions.

E. Expands Student-Athlete Opportunities

This change increases meaningful playing opportunities while still maintaining reasonable participation limits.

Conclusion

The 6-quarter rule has already proven valuable for 1A basketball programs. Aligning contest counting with a weekly model similar to football is a practical and necessary refinement that promotes fairness, flexibility, and increased participation.

Recommendation:

Adopt the revised contest-counting model allowing six (6) quarters of participation per week (Tuesday–Monday) to count as one (1) contest in 1A basketball.

Example: Friday a full JV contest, Saturday a half a game contest = 1 Contest

Proposal to the Oregon School Activities Association

Submitted by the OAOA Basketball Committee

Subject: Requirement for 3-Person Officiating Crews for All Varsity Basketball Contests (4A and Above)

Introduction

The Oregon Athletic Officials Association (OAOA) Basketball Committee respectfully submits this proposal to the Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA).

The purpose of this proposal is to strengthen the consistency, quality, and fairness of high school basketball in Oregon by moving from a recommendation to a requirement:

- **Beginning with the 2026–27 season**, all Boys’ and Girls’ Varsity basketball contests at the **4A classification and above** shall be officiated by a 3-person crew.
 - **By the 2028–29 season**, this requirement shall extend to all Boys’ and Girls’ Varsity basketball contests across every OSAA classification.
-

Background

According to the current OSAA Handbook:

“At the varsity level, three officials are recommended, but at least two officials are required, and one official may be used in an emergency situation only.”

While this language acknowledges the value of 3-person officiating, the fact that it is only recommended — not required — has led to inconsistent adoption across schools and leagues. As a result, many varsity contests continue to be officiated by 2-person crews despite the proven advantages of 3-person mechanics and the postseason requirement already in place.

Case Study: Central Oregon

In this example, the situation described is actual and ongoing in Central Oregon, despite being uncommon. The assignor in Central Oregon is facing significant challenges with a school (North Lake HS) located nearly 100 miles from the base area and two schools around 50 miles away (Culver HS & Gilchrist HS) that have all requested 2-person crews for all of their home dates. One school in particular runs a four-game stack on Fridays (JV/JV/Varsity/Varsity), starting at 2:00 p.m.

To meet this demand under a 2-person model, the assignor is being forced to find and provide four separate crews — eight officials — because he does not have officials who will work multiple games in a 2-person format, even at the JV level. With a roster of 75 officials, and roughly 30% blocked on a given Friday night due to conflicts or availability, this requirement places an unimaginable strain on his resources. Instead of sending eight officials, they have been sending two 3-person crews to work the double headers at both levels which relieves the strain on the assignor's roster and is more cost-efficient for the school.

Eugene, Salem, and Mid-Valley: The Reality of Officiating Availability

Across the state, officials are continually striving to improve and work at the highest levels of competition available to them. In Eugene, Salem, and the Mid-Valley, many of the most experienced officials also work at the collegiate level. These officials will not — and in many cases cannot — accept 2-person assignments, as doing so creates mechanical conflicts that jeopardize their higher-level contracts.

When those officials are removed from the pool of available assignments, the effect is immediate: less experienced officials are placed into games they are not yet fully prepared to handle. This is not intended as a warning from the Associations, but rather a clear reality: if schools choose to rely on 2-person crews, they will inevitably receive less qualified officials on their Varsity contests.

Officials as Independent Contractors

It is important to remember that officials are independent contractors, not employees of schools or associations. As such, they retain the right to accept or decline assignments based on their availability, preferences, and professional standards. When experienced officials choose not to accept 2-person crew assignments, it is not an act of defiance but a professional decision to protect the quality of their work and, in many cases, to safeguard their higher-level contracts that require strict adherence to 3-person mechanics. This independence is a cornerstone of officiating and ensures that officials maintain control over their professional integrity, even if it means certain games may be staffed with less experienced personnel when only 2-person crews are offered.

Challenges with 2-Person Crews

The limitations of 2-person mechanics are well-documented and create significant issues for schools, athletes, and officials:

1. **Transition Officiating** – In fast breaks, one official is sprinting to the end line while the other trails behind, leaving critical off-ball contact and secondary matchups uncovered.
 2. **Off-Ball Coverage** – Both officials are naturally drawn to the ball, leaving cutters, screens, and weak-side rebounding largely unobserved.
 3. **Baseline & Post Play** – The lead official must cover both strong-side and weak-side post play, which is nearly impossible to manage accurately.
 4. **Clock & Game Management** – With only two sets of eyes, crews are more likely to miss game/shot clock violations, substitutions, or bench conduct issues. Even with a 3-person crew, no single official is assigned exclusively to monitor the game and shot clocks. However, with three sets of eyes, clock awareness can be shared and consistently maintained. In a 2-person crew, officials are already overextended with primary coverage responsibilities, leaving virtually no effective way to monitor the game, the game clock, and the shot clock with accuracy.
 5. **Increased Fatigue** – Two officials cover far more physical ground, leading to slower positioning and poorer angles in late-game situations.
 6. **Coach & Player Perception** – Missed calls from limited coverage erode trust and increase conflict, resulting in more tension on the floor between officials and coaches/players.
 7. **Training Limitations** – Officials who primarily work 2-person mechanics are not adequately prepared for higher level, physical play, weakening the development pipeline. The majority of training at the Association level is for 3-person crews. 2-person training is limited to newer or less experienced officials.
 8. **Loss of Experienced Officials** – Many higher-level officials decline 2-person assignments, as the mechanics differ significantly from their college/postseason work. To avoid bad habits that carry over, they simply refuse these games — reducing access to the state's most experienced referees. Losing these officials means they are being replaced with less proficient officials working the 2-person crew assignments.
-

Rationale for the Change

1. Improved Court Coverage & Accuracy

With three officials — lead, trail, and center — coverage responsibilities are divided into balanced zones. Every play is observed from the correct angle, eliminating blind spots inherent in the 2-person system. Calls are more accurate, consistent, and credible, elevating the integrity of the crew and the game.

2. Player Safety Considerations

One of the most compelling reasons to mandate 3-person officiating crews is the direct impact on player safety. Basketball has grown faster, more physical, and more athletic at the high school level, particularly in 4A–6A classifications. With only two officials on the floor, large areas of play — especially weak-side rebounding, off-ball screens, and transition matchups — are left with limited or no coverage. This increases the likelihood that illegal contact, dangerous collisions, or unsporting behavior goes undetected until it escalates. By contrast, a 3-person crew provides full-court balance, ensuring that one official can always focus on off-ball action while the others cover primary responsibilities. This additional coverage not only improves the accuracy of officiating but more importantly serves as a proactive safeguard for athletes, reducing the risk of injury and protecting the integrity of the game.

3. Consistency Across Classifications & Communities

By requiring 3-person officiating, OSAA ensures that varsity athletes across the state — regardless of league or location — compete under the same standard of officiating. This uniformity reduces confusion and reinforces fairness.

4. Alignment with Postseason & Higher Levels

Currently, some schools play entire seasons with 2-person crews, only to face 3-person crews in the postseason. This abrupt shift at the highest level of competition creates unnecessary challenges. Aligning regular-season contests with postseason mechanics ensures consistency and fairness while preparing athletes for collegiate play, where 3-person crews are universal.

5. Support for Recruitment & Retention of Officials

Expanding 3-person mechanics strengthens Oregon's officiating pipeline:

- Veteran officials remain motivated with meaningful, challenging assignments.
- New officials grow faster by working alongside experienced referees in 3-person systems.
- More officials become postseason-ready, improving the quality of OSAA's most visible events.

- Officials who also work at higher levels remain engaged, since 3-person mechanics match the standards they already use.

Implementation Timeline

- **2026–27 Season:** The OSAA would require 3-person crews for all Boys' and Girls' Varsity basketball contests at the **4A classification and above**.
- **2028–29 Season:** Requirement expands to include **all Varsity basketball contests across every OSAA classification**.

We acknowledge that the expense of a third official may appear to be a simple cost-saving measure in difficult times, but doing so comes at the expense of game quality, safety, and fairness. This phased approach gives schools, leagues, and assignors time to budget, plan, and recruit additional officials while steadily raising standards. One solution for schools would be a modest increase to gate entry fees. Here is a model based on a current \$7 entry fee with 15 home dates and what it would need to be increased to cover a 3rd official per varsity contest:

Average Attendance	Added Cost per Ticket	New Entry Fee
200 fans	\$0.46	\$7.46
100 fans	\$0.92	\$7.92
75 fans	\$1.23	\$8.23
50 fans	\$1.85	\$8.85

Implementation Considerations

1. Training and Education

- The OAOA will work with local officiating associations to provide training opportunities in 3-person mechanics.
- Preseason clinics, on-court demonstrations, and in-season evaluations will reinforce correct rotations and coverage.
- Online resources (webinars, video breakdowns, and self-paced modules) will be expanded to ensure access for officials statewide.

2. Phased Rollout and Support

- The phased timeline allows schools and leagues time to budget and adjust.
- Local associations will be encouraged to gradually increase 3-person contests before the requirement to ease the transition.

3. Assigning and Scheduling Adjustments

- Assignors will strategically balance crew availability, especially in the early years.
- OAOA will provide resources and best practices for efficient scheduling and crew management.
- Priority will be ensuring officials receive consistent 3-person experience before postseason assignments.

4. Collaboration with Schools and Athletic Directors

- Athletic directors will be provided clear communication on the rationale, expectations, and phased timeline.
- Schools will be encouraged to begin budgeting ahead of the mandate.
- Open forums and Q&A opportunities will be offered to address logistical concerns.

5. Recruitment and Retention Strategy

- OAOA and local associations will continue recruitment efforts, targeting former athletes, coaches, and community members.
- Veteran officials will be retained by offering consistent 3-person opportunities.
- New officials will be paired with experienced referees in 3-person crews for mentoring and accelerated development.

6. Evaluation and Feedback

- OAOA will collect feedback from officials, local associations, athletic directors, and coaches during early implementation.
 - Adjustments to training, scheduling, and resources will be made as needed.
 - Annual updates will be provided to OSAA to demonstrate accountability and progress.
-

Conclusion

The OAOA Basketball Committee strongly and unanimously recommends adoption of this proposal. The evidence is clear: mandating 3-person officiating crews will elevate the quality, fairness, and safety of Oregon high school basketball.

Specifically, this requirement will:

- **Provide better coverage and more accurate officiating** — Three officials allow for proper positioning across all areas of the floor, reducing missed calls and improving the consistency of enforcement.
- **Enhance athlete safety** — With three officials, every area of the court has consistent coverage. Off-ball action, rebounding battles, and post play are closely monitored, reducing the chance of missed illegal screens, excessive contact, or retaliatory behavior. This added layer of supervision protects athletes from unnecessary risks and helps prevent injuries before they occur.
- **Establish statewide consistency** — By moving from a recommendation to a requirement, all schools and leagues will operate under the same standard, eliminating discrepancies between regions.
- **Align Oregon with postseason and higher-level standards** — The NFHS and OSAA postseason contests already utilize 3-person mechanics. Making this the norm during the regular season prepares athletes, coaches, and officials for championship-level competition.
- **Strengthen the recruitment, training, and retention of officials** — Offering consistent 3-person opportunities keeps experienced officials engaged, prevents burnout from 2-person workloads, and provides new officials with structured pathways for development.

Finally, the phased implementation timeline — beginning with **4A and above in 2026–27**, then expanding to **all varsity contests by 2028–29** — ensures schools, leagues, and assignors have sufficient time to budget, recruit, and train. This gradual approach balances the need for higher standards with the realities of planning and resources, making the transition both achievable and sustainable.

In summary, requiring 3-person crews is not simply an upgrade to officiating mechanics — it is an investment in the integrity of competition, the safety of student-athletes, and the long-term health of Oregon high school basketball.

Dear Peter, Kelly and Debi,

I hope this email finds you all doing well. I am writing to you today in my capacity as an active wrestling official, a school administrator, a former athletic director, and a representative for the MetroWest Wrestling Officials Association (MWWOA). Having participated in numerous OSAA-sanctioned events in various roles—as an athlete, coach, administrator, and official—I have a deep commitment to the integrity and professionalism of all of our sports.

My purpose in writing is to respectfully request a review of and a permanent exception to the OSAA Athletic Officials Handbook requirement, specifically Rule 9, for the officials for wrestling. This section mandates that wrestling officials wear the current year's OSAA patch on the left sleeve of their uniform.

The current handbook states: "All officials shall wear the current year's OSAA patch while officiating any OSAA-sanctioned contest... Wrestling – on the left sleeve of the shirt, just below the shoulder." While I fully support proper official identification and compliance with OSAA standards, several factors specific to wrestling officiating suggest this requirement is highly impractical and potentially counterproductive:

Rationale for Elimination

1. Practicality, Durability, and Uniform Hygiene Wrestling is unique in that the official is intentionally up and down from the mat area regularly throughout the match. This constant, physical contact with the mat makes it nearly impossible to secure the patch reliably using temporary means like magnets, Velcro, or safety pins. The patch comes loose, resulting in a distraction and a less professional appearance. Two years ago during a state championship match, when the referee started the state finals match the wrestlers brushed against the official when they engaged. The officials patch came off of his shirt and was stuck to the top of one of the wrestlers hair for a majority of the two-minute period.

Furthermore, officials frequently work intense, back-to-back day tournaments. Due to the physical nature of the work and necessary hygiene standards, uniforms must be washed nightly. Since officials own multiple shirts, they would need to constantly move a single patch between uniforms, which eliminates the possibility of permanently sewing or gluing the patch on, and necessitates ordering multiple patches, which is an added and unnecessary expense.

2. Modernization and Alternatives for Recognition As we transition to new uniform tops, this presents an excellent opportunity to modernize our approach. We could easily and permanently subliminate the OSAA logo, the OADA logo, and/or the official's association directly onto the uniform fabric. This provides clear recognition without the physical hassle or durability issues of an affixed patch that only lasts for one season.

3. Certification and Verification In my many years in sports administration, I have never been in a position to need to check or verify an official's certification by scrutinizing their patch. The patch, as currently distributed, merely confirms that an individual has paid the registration fee, not that they have successfully passed the annual test or are a truly certified official. The patch, therefore, fails to fulfill a meaningful verification function at the contest site. All assigners for

wrestling are verifying through Arbiter that their officials are certified before assigning them to a match.

4. Established Precedence We already have precedence for patch exemptions, as the handbook notes that no patch is worn for Cheerleading. Additionally, many large tournaments already provide officials with specific event polo or t-shirts for use during that contest, and those garments do not feature the OSAA patch, showing that identification can be met through other means.

In conclusion, eliminating the physical patch requirement for wrestling officials would streamline the official's uniform process and requirements, improve the professional appearance and functionality during contests, and allow us to adopt modern, permanent logo integration methods.

I would greatly appreciate the opportunity to discuss this proposal further and explore the necessary steps required to make such a change to the handbook and an exception for this rule. We want to maintain OSAA recognition while improving the overall experience for our officials.

This proposal has the support of our SRI and our Wrestling Specific Sport Committee.

Video Recording devices

Associations may elect to use hat cams if they follow the following items currently as best practices required to manage a program like this. Controlled use cameras are collected the same night by training committee members. Footage is uploaded to Hudl within 24 hours.

Hat cameras may only be used for training, evaluation, and safety purposes.

Devices are issued and managed by the association, not individuals. All devices are owned and maintained by the association. Cameras are distributed and collected by designated personnel.

Officials do not retain possession of devices outside of assigned use Footage Management & Access.

All footage is uploaded to a centralized, association-controlled platform. Access is limited to active association officials. Footage is not shared publicly or outside the association by individual officials public distribution. No posting of general hat camera footage on social media or public platforms. Footage may be used for public training awareness and outreach i.e., clips of the week or other approved training and outreach.

Officials are not allowed to utilize their own video recording devices on the field. Nor are they allowed to post footage on ANY social media platform.
