At the meeting on September 14, 2026, the OSAA Executive Board took the following action:

- Received a review of the 2026-27 Championships Calendar from Missy Smith, OSAA Assistant Executive Director.

- Voted to deny a request to require 3-person crews in varsity Basketball at the 4A, 5A, and 6A classifications.
- Voted to eliminate the physical OSAA Patch requirement for Wrestling officials.
- Voted to authorize the use of recording devices by officials during a contest for training purposes.

OSAA PRIORITIES FOR 2026-27

STANDING PRIORITIES

OPERATIONS – Work closely with our member schools and affiliated organizations (OACA, OADA, OAOA, OATS, SMAC, ODE, COSA, OSBA, NFHS, OMEA, DDCA, OCCA, etc.) to provide memorable experiences for all involved in Oregon high school activities. Prioritize investments in technology and continuing professional development for our staff to keep Oregon at the forefront of state, regional, and national plans and initiatives.

COMMUNICATIONS – Effectively spread the message of who we are, what we do, and how we do it to our member schools, coaches, students, and community members. As the governing body of Oregon high school activities, continue to engage in conversation around the positive attributes of education-based activities. Review policies, procedures, and resources to ensure high school activities are safe and welcoming for all.

FINANCIAL – Monitor all aspects of our postseason events with the goal of providing memorable lifelong experiences for all involved while being fiscally responsible, including adjustments to events when necessary. Protect the short-term and long-term financial stability of the Association by examining day-to-day operations.

FOUNDATION – Positively impact an increasing number of students and school communities through varied programs and grants. Maintain focus on getting students active, keeping them safe, promoting the great things our schools and students are achieving, and working to remove barriers for students to fully participate in high school activities throughout the state.

2026-27 PRIORITIES

Fully implement the changes adopted for 2026-30 through the Classification and Districting and State Championship Committee processes. Establish a Computation of ADM Task Force to examine current policy and suggest adjustments to how school enrollments are configured and which factors are included in the calculation formula. Implement opportunities for feedback and collaboration from member schools, students, coaches, officials, and affiliated organizations within committee/task force processes while emphasizing responsiveness, collaboration, and service to the membership.

Continue the work of the Transfer/Eligibility Task Force and implement appropriate recommendations. Evaluate transfer and eligibility rules with an emphasis on equity, consistency, clarity, fairness, and their impact on students and member schools. Monitor implementation of online OSAA Transfer Form and its impact on processes and data collection while engaging the membership as recommendations and potential rule changes are considered.

Collaborate with member schools, affiliate associations and student-athletes to address sportsmanship and fan behavior at regular-season and state championship events. Emphasize student leadership development, through expanded opportunities for Student Advisory Council members and regional Captains Camps.

Continue to improve education, prevention, response, and support surrounding discriminatory bias incidents at member school events. Create, evaluate and adjust practical tools designed to prevent and respond to incidents, support those impacted, and emphasize restorative practices. Review reported incidents to identify trends and areas where additional education or support is needed. Continue collaboration between OSAA staff and The Center in establishing an equity lens to be used in policy and decision-making.

Work together with the Sports Medicine Advisory Committee, Oregon Health Authority, and Oregon Department of Education to thoroughly review health and safety policies, requirements, and forms related to concussion management, emergency action plans, air quality, heat index and AD/coach certifications and recommend changes when necessary to continue alignment with state statutes and help ensure student participant safety.

1. Reserved Seating
 - A. Only schools offering reserved seating for regular season games may sell reserved seats for playoff games. Schools cannot increase the price of reserved seats for the playoffs. Regardless of what the school charges, the OSAA must receive their listed adult ticket price for first / second rounds through semifinals for any reserved seats.
 - B. If schools have not had reserved seating during regular season play, they may not institute such a policy for playoffs.
2. Student is any child aged 5 and up through a senior in high school.
3. There is no admission charged to spectators at the Tennis, Golf, Solo Music, or Speech State Championships.

2026-27 Playoff Reimbursement Formula

The formula below will determine state championship reimbursement for member schools. The formula prioritizes roundtrip miles* traveled (M) but also factors in the number of participants (P) and the number of days (D) a school participates in a state championship. An expense metric (E) is calculated for each school participating at a state championship that will determine the school's proportion of the overall total expense metrics for all schools for that season. Schools are then reimbursed seasonally (Fall, Winter, Spring) based on their portion of that season's budgeted reimbursement.

$$E = 2 \cdot P^{0.8125} \times (2 \cdot M)^{(0.75 + D/16)}$$

2026-27 Total Reimbursement Budget: \$850,000 Fall: \$289,000 (34%) Winter: \$255,000 (30%) Spring: \$306,000 (36%)

Schools will be reimbursed based on the number of participants in a state championship. The number of student participants in team sports is outlined per OSAA policy as listed below.

Individual Sports & Activities

Reimbursement will be determined by the number of participants competing in a state championship. Those activities include Band, Cheerleading, Choir, Cross Country, Dance/Drill, Golf, Orchestra, Solo Music, Speech, Swimming, Tennis, Track & Field, and Wrestling. Schools do not receive reimbursement for non-participating alternates.

School Personnel

The number of student participants in a state championship will determine the number of school personnel (i.e., coaches, directors, drivers, chaperones, etc.) for which the school will receive reimbursement. The OSAA will reimburse an additional person for every five student participants, up to a maximum of five.

1 – 5 student participants = +1 school personnel

6 – 10 student participants = +2 school personnel

11 – 15 student participants = +3 school personnel

16 – 20 student participants = +4 school personnel

21+ student participants = +5 school personnel

Examples:

- A school qualifying seven student participants in track & field will receive reimbursement for a total of nine people (seven student participants plus two school personnel).
- A 4A school with a football team participating in the first round of the state championships will receive reimbursement for a total of 45 people (40 student participants plus five school personnel).

*Note: Schools traveling less than 200 miles round trip for a state championship event will not receive reimbursement.

Computation of ADM Task Force

CHARGE:

The OSAA Executive Board requests that the Computation of ADM Task Force review the following topics:

- Current computation formula used by the OSAA to classify schools as outlined in Article 6.3.
- Changes that were made during the previous iteration of this Task Force, including:
 - Using ADMr for grades 9-11 vs. 9-12
 - Three-year average vs. one-year snapshot
 - Counting 9-11 students residing in the school's attendance boundary but attending a separate non-full member school administered by that school's school district
 - SES Factor, including use of the Free and Reduced Price Eligibility of Oregon Public Schools report
 - Private School reporting process
- Additional criteria to potentially consider based on feedback during the Classification and Districting process:
 - Using school participation figures in the computation formula
 - Adjusting/eliminating the SES factor
 - Counting 9-12 students again
 - Factoring in the impact of transfers
 - Incorporating a success/lack of success factor
 - Adjusting how private schools are classified
 - Examining any disproportionate impact of current formula on smaller schools
- Review of other reports from the Oregon Department of Education that could provide a better view of school populations as it relates to interscholastic participation.
- Consideration of policies in effect in other states as it relates to computation of ADM
- Plus, any other topics deemed relevant by the Task Force

The Task Force may forward recommendations for modifications to the OSAA Executive Board.

MEETINGS:

Meeting schedule will be determined once Task Force is convened. Opportunities for public testimony to be determined by the Task Force. Updates will be issued to the membership after each meeting.

Proposal to Amend Article 6.2.4. (a) – Classification of Schools – Petition to Play Down
(Action Item)

QUESTION: Should the Executive Board propose an amendment to Article 6.2.4. (a) – Classification of Schools – Petition to Play Down to the Delegate Assembly that would clarify the deadlines for when a school must submit a request to play down?

RATIONALE: Following the conclusion of last year’s Classification and Districting Committee process, staff suggested adjustments to the submission deadline and appeal process timing for schools requesting to play down. These changes will enable the Classification and Districting Committee to have timely information when forming their recommendations to the Executive Board and Delegate Assembly.

6.2.4 Classification of Schools – Classification Thresholds. During the four-year time block, the following Average Daily Membership (ADM) thresholds will be used by the Executive Board when considering school placement or classification changes:

6A: 1026 or more

4A: 281 to 580

2A: 66 to 140

5A: 581 to 1025

3A: 141 to 280

1A: 10 to 65

EXCEPTION: OSAA member schools shall participate based upon ADM in the classifications defined in this Article unless an exception has been granted by the Executive Board in response to the submission of a Petition to Play Down, a Petition to Play Up, or Placement in a Different Classification – Football Only.

(a) Petition to Play Down.

(Petition to Play Down)

(1) Submission Deadline. Except as specified in Article 6.2.2 (c), a member school seeking to play in a lower classification than assigned under Article 6.2.4 shall be required to complete and submit a “Petition to Play Down” to the OSAA **Executive Board prior to its September meeting immediately** ~~prior to October 1~~ preceding the quadrennial December Classification and Districting Meeting.

(2) Athletics and Activities Affected. Any “Petition to Play Down” granted by the Executive Board shall apply to all OSAA athletics and activities in which the member school participates, except as outlined below.

a) Sport/Activity Returning to or Remaining at Original Classification. Any school sport or activity playing below their classification based on an approved Petition to Play down will return to their original classification if the following occurs:

1. Team Sports. If a team sport qualifies for the state playoffs and wins a contest while playing down or in the immediately preceding season to

the Petition to Play Down being granted, that specific team sport will return to or stay at their original classification for the next school year.

2. Individual Sports and Activities. If an individual sport or activity team receives a trophy at their state championship while playing down or in the immediately preceding season to the Petition to Play Down being granted, that specific individual sport or activity team will return to or stay at their original classification for the next school year.

(3) Duration. Any “Petition to Play Down” granted by the Executive Board shall apply to the classification placement of the petitioning member school during the entire subsequent four-year time block, except as outlined above.

(4) Required Information. A member school submitting a “Petition to Play Down” shall provide the following information for consideration by the Executive Board over the previous three years of the time block.

- a)** A school’s overall in-class winning percentage over the immediately preceding three-year period in team sports that is less than 20% (excluding football).
- b)** A school’s individual sports participation numbers that are less than the standard deviation compared to the average of schools in their current classification.

(5) Additional Information. A member school submitting a “Petition to Play Down” may provide any other information to the Executive Board in support of the petition including, but not limited to, evidence of intervention undertaken by the district to address lack of competitive success and a letter of current league support for the “Petition to Play Down.”

(6) Appeal Process. A school not meeting the criteria set forth above but wanting to Petition to Play Down may appeal to the OSAA Executive Board ~~at~~ **prior to its September meeting immediately preceding** the quadrennial **December Classification and Districting Meeting** ~~December Board meeting~~. To be able to appeal, schools must meet one of the criteria in (a)(4) above and the school must meet both of the following criteria:

- a)** A school’s overall in-class winning percentage over the immediately preceding three-year period in team sports is under 30% (excluding football).
- b)** Have no more than 20% of the activities sponsored by the school that would remain at the original classification per (a)(2)a) above.

Proposal to Amend Rule 8.2.3. – Duration of Eligibility/Graduation

(Action Item)

QUESTION: *Should the Executive Board propose an amendment to Rule 8.2.3. – Duration of Eligibility/Graduation to the Delegate Assembly that would codify the current interpretation of timing regarding student eligibility upon graduation?*

RATIONALE: During its annual review with legal counsel, it was determined that clarification was needed regarding the eligibility of senior students whose school graduates at the end of the school year but prior to the end of interscholastic activities for the Spring season.

8.2. Duration of Eligibility/Graduation.

Rule: A student may participate in the interscholastic program for four consecutive years (eight semesters or the equivalent) after entering the 9th grade, EXCEPT AS INDICATED LATER IN THIS RULE.

FOREIGN COUNTRY SCHOOL YEAR EXCEPTION: If a student attends a school in a foreign country and that school starts their normal school calendar year prior to the start of the Oregon school year and then transfers to attend an Oregon high school, the time attending school prior to the start of the Oregon school year shall not be considered for the purpose of computing duration of eligibility under this rule.

Rationale:

The objective of the Duration of Eligibility/Graduation Rule is to ensure that the student's educational performance reflects progress towards graduation, and to ensure fair competition between schools and between individual students. As students grow older, they become bigger, quicker, and stronger, which translates into an athletic advantage. Greater maturity may also provide a competitive advantage in non-athletic activities. Rules such as this one allows for safety of competition between competing students and allow for fair competition between students in the same school vying for a particular spot on a particular team. Further, through the application of this rule, participation in athletics and activities is an incentive to the achievement of that minimum standard of academic performance.

This rule: promotes timely progress toward graduation by discouraging students from delaying or interrupting their high school education; disallows students to enroll for one semester each school year to increase maturity, athletic ability, and skill; promotes equality of competition; diminishes risks stemming from unequal competition; and places emphasis on the academic mission of the school.

This rule: promotes harmony and fair competition among member schools by maintaining equality of eligibility; and provides each student with the same number of semesters of eligibility, which increases the number of students who will have an opportunity to participate in interscholastic activities.

8.2.1. A student entering the 9th grade for all, or part of a school year has used a full year of eligibility for the purpose of computing duration of eligibility under this rule.

- 8.2.2.** A student who begins participation in an OSAA sponsored activity prior to entering the 9th grade is only eligible for four consecutive years beginning the year the student first participated for all or part of the year.
- 8.2.3.** A student becomes ineligible upon graduation from high school ***except that if a student graduates at the end of a school year – in May or June – they remain eligible for spring sports and activities, including postseason.***

1. Q. *May a student who finishes all requirements and officially graduates at the end of the first semester (usually January/February) remain eligible?*
 A. *No. The student becomes immediately ineligible upon graduation from high school as they are no longer considered a full-time enrolled student.*
2. Q. *May a traditional spring graduate (May or June) remain eligible to complete the regular season and any OSAA postseason events in a spring sport and/or activity?*
 A. *Yes, provided the student completed their final transcribed grading period, the graduation occurs during that same transcribed grading period, and the student was full-time enrolled and academically eligible up until the graduation date.*

QUESTION: *Should the Executive Board propose an amendment to Rule 8.2.4. – Fifth Year Hardship Appeal Procedure to the Delegate Assembly that would adjust conditions for consideration when reviewing eligibility for a fifth year hardship?*

RATIONALE: During its annual Handbook review with legal counsel, it was suggested that this appeals procedure be amended based on the recent history of requests and particularly as it relates to the conditions the Executive Director and Executive Board consider when reviewing requests.

8.2.4. Fifth Year Hardship Appeals Procedure. The Executive Board, or as it may provide, the Executive Director, may in individual cases, upon written request once the student has begun their last transcribed grading period prior to exhausting their eligibility, declare eligible for up to one year a student who would otherwise be ineligible under Rule 8.2., “Duration of Eligibility/Graduation” because more than eight semesters have passed after the student entered the 9th grade if the student has not previously been granted eligibility based upon a fifth year or age hardship appeal and all of the following conditions are met:

- (a) The student has not graduated from high school or earned the required number of credits to graduate, but has chosen not to graduate;
- (b) The student establishes, to the reasonable satisfaction of the Executive Board or the Executive Director, as the case may be, either:
 - (1) That the student’s Individualized Education Program Team has determined that the student has a disability (as defined below), and that the student was meeting the requirements of the student’s IEP, yet was unable to graduate from high school within eight semesters after entering the 9th grade primarily because of the disability; or
 - (2) Due to circumstances beyond the control of each of the student and the student’s parent(s) **(which may include whether a student’s diagnosed disability has caused the circumstances)**, there has been both a significant absence from school (not less than one semester) and an inability to obtain academic credit during that period of absence; ~~or~~
 - ~~(3) That the student, based on their initial placement upon entering high school in newcomer classes due to limited English language ability (based on an assessment of the student’s transcript and results of ELPA21 and/or Woodcock-Munoz, etc.), was enrolled in and passed classes that earned the student credits that did not count toward graduation requirements and therefore was unable to graduate high school within eight semesters after entering the 9th grade primarily due to their lack of English language ability, provided that the student has not already participated for four years in any sport / activity; and~~

- (c) The student establishes, to the reasonable satisfaction of the Executive Board or Executive Director, as the case may be, that the student's participation would not constitute an undue risk to the health or safety of other participants.
- (d) Without limiting the evidence that may be considered, the Executive Board or Executive Director, as the case may be, may consider the following in determining whether the student's participation would constitute an undue risk to the health or safety of other participants:
 - (1) Whether the student has presented a report from a physician regarding the student's height, weight and whether the student is likely to pose an undue risk to the safety and health of other participants; the student shall submit to an independent medical examination by a physician selected by and paid for by the Association at the request of the Executive Board or Executive Director; and
 - (2) Whether the sport is a contact or a non-contact sport.
- (e) Should an otherwise ineligible student who has already been granted a year of eligibility under the provisions of this rule apply for eligibility for a subsequent year, the Executive Board, or as it may provide, the Executive Director may consider the following factors in addition to those previously stated in this rule, ***to assess whether the student's continued participation would provide the student with an unfair competitive advantage:***
 - (1) Whether the student has previously participated in the sport for which eligibility is sought, or a similar sport; and
 - (2) Whether the student's skill level in the sport for which eligibility is sought is such that the student was ever a member of a starting team or was the recipient of league or other honors as a result of participation in the sport; and
 - (3) Whether the student has participated in a prior state championship competition (either in an individual sport or a team sport).

For purposes of this Rule 8.2.4, disability shall have the meaning provided in the ~~Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1401(a)~~ ***Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. § 12102.***

The Executive Board or the Executive Director may, ***applying the purposes and policies of this rule,*** grant eligibility as to one sport and deny it as to another sport.

A decision of the Executive Director denying eligibility may be appealed to the Executive Board. A decision of the Executive Board denying eligibility may be appealed to a Hearings Officer under Rule 9, "Hearings Officer." ***The final outcome of such appeal(s) is the final decision of the OSAA.***
