**ARE YOU READY FOR THE PLAYOFFS??** The season is quickly winding down, but the competition is ramping up! The best is yet to come with playoffs and then championships in just a few days.

# Situations & Observations - These have come my way since our last bulletin:

#### \*Signals –

A touched ball hits a vertical backboard over a playable area: The whistle is blown as soon as the backboard is contacted. If the R1 determines the ball could have remained in play and there is someone there to play it, a "replay" is signaled. If the R1 determines the ball would have not been playable, then the signal is "out".

Signaling numbers: The signaling of numbers in the rulebook and NFHS publications is in conjunction with net faults, not centerline faults. Should a coach ask for a number on a centerline violation, the R2 may provide it but we don't automatically display the number.

Ball passes completely under the net (other than a served ball): Point toward the centerline with the index finger.

#### \*Correcting Errors -

The R1 signals a point to the wrong team. The opposing coach requests and is granted a substitution by the R2. Realizing the mistake, the R1 reverses the point and awards the ball to the correct team. The scorebook is corrected, and the substitution (or a libero replacement) may be withdrawn without penalty if the team so chooses. Please refer to Casebook 9.9.1E Comment: The team should not be penalized for a correction made by a member of the officiating crew.

# \*Cheers & Jeers -

Sportsmanship has been a point of emphasis this year. Please continue to work with home management should you become aware of unsporting conduct from the fans.

From the OSAA Handbook: Students may cheer during serves in volleyball so long as they are just "making noise" and not specifically addressing a contest official or an individual player from the opposing team. Some examples of unacceptable conduct include but are not limited to disrespecting players by name, number or position; negative cheers or chants; throwing objects on the playing surface; use of derogatory or racially explicit language; and discriminatory harassment or conduct.

## **Teamwork**

Teamwork is essential to good officiating. It takes the entire crew (R1,R2, Line Judges, Scorer, Tracker, Timer) working together for the most successful match. Here's some thoughts:

- Each job is of equal importance and dependent on the other. Respect your crew.
- Always pre-match with your crew, even if you've worked together before and especially now for playoffs & championships
- R1 initiates the conversation with the R2 and the line judges
- R2 reviews duties with the table crew
- Be specific. Cover unusual situations.
- Keep your crew engaged. Lots of eye contact, perhaps a head nod. Let each official do their job.
- Cooperate with and be loyal to other members of the crew.
- Remember the match is about the players
